MEMORAIL DAY SOLUTE Captain Otto Bismarck "Bizzy" Kayser '28 by Dan Reagan

In school Bizzy allwas an conference Guard on the football

team, star wrestler, Battalion Adjutant, and Colorado Gamma President. Upon graduation in 1928 Bizzy began his service in the US Army Air Force.

In November of 1941, as tensions were mounting in the Pacific, Bizzy was assigned to the 5th Interceptor Command in the Philippine Islands. The Japanese would attack only 17 days later on destroying the field and all their aircrafts.

With no aircraft left his mission shifted to providing ground defense. Although willfully unequipped, they gallantly fought for 93 days until they were forced to surrender. In the end 10,000 men were killed and 20,000 wounded.

Now a prisoner he was forced to march 66 miles from Bataan to San Fernando. An estimated 10,000 POWs died on the March: the Bataan Death March is one of the worst atrocities in modern warfare. Bizzy was imprisoned at the notorious Comp O'Donnell for 71 days, in conditions that were so horrendous that 26,000 Filipinos and 2,000 Americans would die of disease and undernourishment.

In July 1942 Bizzy was moved to the POW Camps at Cabanatuan. By now death rate soared to 50 men/day. Those that did survive faced brutal living conditions, disease, torture, and

malnourishment, and lived in constant fear they would be executed.

Bizzy would remain there for more than two years until October of 1944, when he was selected to serve in forced-labor camp and was moved to Manila where he was loaded into the Hell Ship Arisan Maru headed for a labor camp in Republic of Formosa, now known as Taiwan.

Once again Bizzy would experience extreme cruelty. He and his fellow prisoners were crammed into cargo holds with little air, ventilation and food or water, for journeys that would ultimately last weeks.

On October 24, 1944, unaware of the American prisoners were among the convoy U.S. submarines attacked the Arisan Maru just off the eastern coast of China. Only nine of the prisoners would survive. At the time, the sinking of the Arisan Maru was the largest loss of American lives in a single disaster at sea.

Sadly after surviving 1066 days of pure hell, Bizzy was tragically lost that night, presumably drowned at sea during the attack. He was 36 years old, posthumously awarded the Purple Heart.

The name "Clair" has a long history in the entertainment industry. Ever since Troy's farther Gene and his brother Roy started the business in 1966, after being asked to bring their sound system on tour with Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons. It is believed they were the first professional sound company to tour with a band.

Troy knew then this is what he was passionate about and would return home after graduating from Colorado State University in 1982 with a degree in business to help run the family business. In 1995 troy took over operations when he named President and CEO.
