THE GODFATHER OF COLORADO GAMMA

The significance of just who Pat Hurley was had been lost to the annals of time. But with the advent of the internet,

search engines, and the digitation of old journals and newspapers we can once again pay our respect to Colorado Gamma's oldest and most loyal member. Walter Patrick (Pat) Hurley Class of 1900

Pat was born on March 27, 1877, in Fall River, Massachusetts. Raised in St. Elmo Colorado and graduated from the Gilpin High School in the Five Points neighborhood of Denver in 1895.

It should be told; Pat Hurley may not have been the best Mechanical Engineering student ever to attend Colorado Agricultural College. Like many young men new to college, he partook in all the benefits and caused much anxiety among the facility during his early college days.

In his freshmanyear, he joined the San Juan Club where he took three meals a day. He soon met men much like himself, in time they banded together and organize as a secretsociety, the "Mystic Circle." The Mysticmen as they were known around campus were not only socially successful, but they were also hard—working and academically successful. They would all go on to become a real who's who on C.A.C. campus.

Pat himself would go on to accomplish a great deal in his time on campus. He became the Chief Trumpeter for the Battalion in his Junior year, First Lieutenant and Battalion Adjutant in his Senior year. He played quarterback on the football team. A member of Philo-Aesthesian Literary Society; served on the program committee and became President of the Society his Senior year. Leader of the college Orchestra, Glee club Secretary and Treasurer. If that was not enough, he was the editor of the Athletic and Local columns for the Rocky Mountain Collegian Newspaper.

After graduation in 1900, Pat became an active member of the C.A.C. Alumni Association (Kind of a cross between our Al Hornung '61 and Jim Benemann'78). Because of his sharp wit and comedic humor, he was often tasked to serve as ToastMaster for many of the C.A.C. alumni events over the years.

In 1905when the men of the Mystic Circle reorganized as a local fraternity the "Tree Apes." The College required them to have a Chapter Advisor, so they called upon Pat Hurley their founder to fill the position. Pat would remain as the Chapter's Advisor through all the fraternity growth and reorganizations, "Tau Alpha", and finally "Sigma Phi Epsilon." That makes Pat the only person to be associated will all the reincarnations of Colorado Gamma.

In 1915 after more than a decade of loyalty to the fraternity, the men of the newly chartered SigEp fraternity formally recognized him for his commitment to the fraternity. The minutes from December 15, 1915, chapter meeting (the very first chapter meeting as SigEp) simply recorded "Mr. Hurley voted for honorary membership." However, it would not

be for another four years until he would actually be initiated into the mysteries of Sigma Phi Epsilon. The brothers announced the event in the December 6, 1919, issue of the SigEp Journal, Pat was issued the pin number 050–0088.

I believe that if Pat Hurley had the opportunity to address the undergraduate members of today, he would give them the samesageadvicehegavethe C.A.C. students in an address he wrote as an alumnus about his time at C.A.C. in the October 26, 1910, issue of the Rocky Mountain Collegian:

"Your time on the stage of action is short, so make the best of it to the glorification of the State which made it possible for you to reap an education, and the men who have guided your destinies on your way thru college."

Who knows how many lives he impacted, Pat Hurley tirelessly served as Alumni Advisor for well over 20, it is not exactly known when Pat Hurley actually stepped down as Chapter Advisor. What we do know is he remained faithful to CAC throughout his life, he even co-chaired the 50th reunion of the class of '00 in 1950.

Walter Patrick Hurley passed away on 7, Jan 1959 at the age of 81 and is buried at Grandview Cemetery in Fort Collins next to his beloved wife Ada.

This past August, fourteen of the undergraduate Chapter leaders, the AVC Members, Our District Governor, Joel Saslaw, all meet up at the CSU Mountain Campus for two days of Leadership Trainingand Workshops.



The goal of our new leadership programing is to identify future leaders of our fraternity and have them learn from the current executive board and AVC about how to shape the next year's undergraduate SigEp experience and to help these members realize their ability to lead themselves, their peersand to makewise decisions to succeed throughout college and beyond graduation.

The members' first session was to face the Low Elements Challenge Course at the mountain campus it is designed to enhance team building and personal growth by taking risks, team communications, group problem solving, and leadership skills are all common focal points.

Another team-buildingchallenge was the assembly of the "Mars Rover" a set of building blocks with I-hooks that had to be reassembled via a set of group tether connected to a hook to pick up the blocks. Not an easy task if everyone does not work together. We must have done well our instructor was quite impressed with how well everyone communicated, supported, and worked together to complete the assembly in record time.

The evening work sessions were focused on learning about the characteristics and traits of a leader, and identifying our personal values. The workshop on the second day focused on the Chapter experience. Time was spent identifying what are and what should the chapter values be. Then they were asked to identify the challenges the chapter is facing. The group then performed a SWAT analysis and set SMART goals on how to improve the chapter experience for the better.

The retreat provided the future leaders with insight into the inner workingsofthe executive board and provided them with the framework to continue to set up Colorado Gamma for success longinto the future.
