RECHARTERING: NEXT STEPS IN OUR RETURN TO CAMPUS



In the Spring of 2014, Colorado Gamma was shuttered when we lost recognition from Colorado State University. Subsequently, our charter from Sigma Phi Epsilon Headquarters was stripped and the chapter went on a four-year hiatus from CSU.

While the mistakes of our past are well-documented, so too is the remarkable work the Chapter has done since returning to campus. Now nearing seventy members and with a fully occupied house expected in the fall of 2021, CO Gamma has proven its viability at CSU and is trending upward in every metric. However, in the eyes of Headquarters, our chapter is still considered a colony. The next major

milestone in our return to Colorado State is the restoration of our national charter.

The charter process exists to prevent flyby-night groups from watering down the SigEp brand. Criteria has been established to measure the aptitude and commitment of every group of men who colonize, and this information is then evaluated by Headquarters to determine their candidacy for charter.

AVC Member **Ryan Garthright '10** is leading the charge on this front and is optimistic about the attainment of a charter in the coming semesters.

"We are currently in the process of rechartering," says Garthright, "Each semester starting last spring, we have petitioned headquarters to earn our charter. HQ wants us to be a self-sustaining and high performing chapter." To prove our case, Garthright is leading the collection and documentation of several key metrics. This is a comprehensive effort, with both undergraduates and AVC members pitching in to develop our petition. Areas of interest for headquarters include finances, standards, member development, recruitment, volunteer board, academics, leadership, and culture.

Unsurprisingly, the bar for chartering is extremely high and colonies typically petition multiple times before earning their charter. Still, the future looks extremely bright for Colorado Gamma. Says Garthright, "We are tracking in the right direction in all areas, and if continued, I expect we earn the charter within a few semesters."

OBITUARIES

The alumni and undergraduates of Colorado Gamma mourn the loss of the following brothers. Our thoughts and sincerest condolences go to their families, friends and loved ones:

Staff Sergeant Don "Bill" Albertson '49

Bill was a World War II Veteran, 89th Bombardment Squadron, 3rd Bombardment Group in the Pacific Theater of Operations. Graduated from Colorado A&M with a degree in chemistry and physics. His notable awards include the Bronze Star.

Donald Kenneth Reichert '52

Don was a Colorado A&M letterman in football, track and field, and wrestling. He earned a degree in Physical Education and General Science; he completed his master's degree in 1956. Don was a Mortar and Tank Turret Instructor from 1952-1954 at Camp Roberts and Camp Irwin in CA. A lifelong coach, teacher and administrator and lifetime member of the Colorado Wrestling Official's Association.

Lt. Col Charles "Chuck" Simon '54

Served active duty in the Air Force for 3 years, served in the Air Force Reserves for 25 years as an intelligence staff officer with duties at Air Defense Command, NORAD, and Pacific Air Command. He retired as a Lt Col. He was the area Air Force Academy liaison officer for 40 years.

Perry Venard '71

Perry received a degree in accounting from CSU which wasn't much help in his chosen profession, plumbing. He seldom charged what his services were worth. He and his wife, Judy were married 42 years. They had one daughter, Sarah who was Perry's pride and joy. An avid skier,

talented bowler, unmatched conversationalist, and loving father, brother and grandfather, Perry loved life.

Kenneth Michael Stubler '75

Ken held multiple degrees from CSU, CU, and Oklahoma State University. Spent more than 45 years in the health services industry. Credited SigEp and CSU for helping him grow and mature. Ken was known for his ability to broker all "discussions" to a meeting of the minds. A lauded home chef with a unique sense of humor, he is survived by the love of his life and sous chef, Kathryn.

SALUTE TO SERVICE: Lieutenant Colonel Victor Reynolds Bird' 62 Benevolent Warrior

To be a benevolent warrior is to do justice, to show kindness, and to walk humbly among both those you saved and fought against.

Vic was commissioned in the infantry in June 1962 upon graduation from Colorado State University. He spent 25 years of active duty as a United States Army Infantry Officer. His overseas assignments included: Republic of Korea (13



months); Vietnam (two tours, 2 years); and Germany (6 years).

Vic received the **Legion of Merit** for his work from 1968 through 1969, when he was responsible for training Regional and Popular Force troops in Vietnam. He fought alongside the troops he trained in more than 100 combat operations.

His trained forces efforts aborted enemy fire directed against his District and effectively neutralized the Viet Cong infrastructure. His advice and assistance to the District Revolutionary Development Council were influential in making it a responsive community organization. He initiated more than 40 development projects including school repairs, agricultural assistance, and road, disciplinary and market construction.

Vic was awarded the **Silver Star** for gallantry in action on March 6, 1969. When his unit came under attack by hostile sized force, Vic directed mortar and heavy artillery support from nearby American units. Bravely exposing himself to a continuous barrage of hostile fire, he adjusted the artillery support to inflict heavy casualties upon the enemy.

When he saw the Vietnamese Company Commander wounded, he assumed control of the company. Exposed to intense hostile fire, he ran from position to position, encouraging the men. He inspired his Vietnamese comrades to regroup and set up defensive positions. Eventually the unit halted the enemy advance. Under intense hostile fire, Vic bravely led a group of soldiers toward the enemy position to evacuate his wounded and assist in their medical treatment.

Vic was awarded the **Meritorious Service Medal** in late April 1975, when the North Vietnamese Army was approaching Saigon. The capitol of South Vietnam was about to fall and President Gerald Ford ordered all American civilians to evacuate along with South Vietnamese refugees. Vic was responsible for the planning effort which resulted in the rapid and successful preparation of the Southeast Asia refugee center at Fort Indiantown Gap in Lebanon County Pennsylvania in May 1975.

For eight months, Fort Indiantown Gap housed more than 20,000 Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees.

Today, 46 years later, there are more 1.3 million immigrants from Vietnam. They and their 300,000 or so children, along with their culture and cuisine, have become yet another inextricable strand that make-up the American fabric. Vic's actions have directly benefited 3 generations of Vietnamese families.
