We closed our construction loan on June 12th and began asbestos abatement on June 15th. A special thanks to Campaign Chairman Al Hornung, '61, and Campaign Treasurer Bryan Harmsen, '01, for the years of work on this project that allowed us to begin construction.

The construction crew completed demolition of the house down to the brick shell and bare studs, and construction is now underway. The library addition is now framed out and the house will be very far along for our construction walk-throughs at the Centennial Homecoming on October 17th.



Catching up with Jerry Byron Smith

We recently had the pleasure of catching up with Jerry Byron Smith, '59, and we want to share with you the many accomplishments of this tremendous brother. Jerry has strong memories of his SigEp days and is a generous donor to the Campaign for Colorado Gamma – 121 E. Lake St. renovation.

Jerry was born and raised in Longmont, Colorado, where he led Longmont High School to their first 5A State championship. While at Colorado State University he was President of Colorado Gamma, lettered in football at CSU as a sophomore and wrestled on the varsity team.

He entered the US Air Force in 1959, flew 1,600 tactical combat support sorties in Vietnam in '67-'68. Assigned to USAF Academy in 1970, he spent 12 years as a Computer Science instructor, installed 5 major computer systems, and retired as Deputy Chief of Staff Computer Resources.

Over his Air Force career, he accrued over 7,000 hours of flying time as a pilot, Instructor pilot and Flight examiner. Jerry was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with three Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, Air Force Commendation Medal, Small Arms Expert Marksmanship, and a large number of other Air Force and Vietnam medals.

Jerry retired from the Air Force in August of 1982 and worked as a defense/ commercial contractor for 23 years, serving as VP of Operations at Inco Inc., McDonnell Douglas Electronics Systems Company, SSDS, Inc., and OTS, Inc. In 1992 Jerry went back to work again, this time overseeing a project to install large fiber optic networks at the Air Force Academy and other locations.

Jerry and his wife Carolyn have been married 56 years. They have traveled extensively, climbed 20 14,000-footers, and biked throughout Colorado and Europe. Some of Jerry's favorite memories are two helicopter ski trips in Canada with his children.

Michael A. Pappas, '77 JUN 11, 1953 – JUL 12, 2015

Sad news for Colorado Gamma SigEp's as one of our beloved brothers, **Michael A. Pappas** lost his painful, heroic battle to a degenerative nerve disease this past month. During his time at 121 East Lake, "Mikey" or "PP" was always a willing participant in every activity that being a SigEp had to offer, and no one embraced that lifestyle more than Mike.

A highlight for both Mike and the chapter was his tenure as Golden Heart Rush Chairman ... a "tasty" time to be sure. Following college, as the years went by Mikey was constantly looking for ways to get the Bro's back together for a little chaos and a good time. Whether it was a tail-gater for a Rams game, a round of golf, or a road trip to a Bowl game, Mikey was always the first to say "Hey ... let's do it!" No surprise, he never failed to find old buddies to join him. Those good times, along with Brother Pappas, will be sorely missed.

Evidence of his impact on SigEp was the more than two dozen brothers who attended his funeral. He was a good man and we are all the better for having known him.

Joseph F. Phelps, '51 • NOV 12, 1927 – APR 15, 2015

Joseph Phelps was born Nov. 12, 1927, in Maysville, Missouri. His parents, Nita and Hensel Phelps, were farmers, but in 1936, in the midst of the Depression, they moved to Greeley, Colo., where Hensel Phelps started a construction company to support the family.


Joseph Phelps graduated from Colorado A & M in 1951 with a degree in construction management. While in college, Mr. Phelps met Barbara Ann Babcock, whom he would marry and have four children. Upon graduating he served three years as a Naval Officer in the Pacific during the Korean War.

In the 1950s and '60s he successfully expanded his father's small local firm into a nationally prominent construction company. He took over the company in 1957 and served as president and general manager until 1975. In 1966 he established a branch office in the San Francisco Bay Area so he could pursue his interest in making wine and, in 1973, he established the Joseph Phelps Vineyards.

In 1974 he decided to make a "proprietary blended" wine from the noble varieties, no one had ever blended quality varieties before. He named it Insignia and it was the first of its kind, leading the way for such giants as Dominus, Rubicon and Napa Valley's flagship blend, Opus One.

Philo L. Thompson, '98 • JAN 27 1976 - MAY 26, 2015



Philo joined Colorado Gamma in spring of 1995. He held a number of positions in the fraternity including VP of Finance. Graduating in 1998, he worked for SigEp headquarters as Regional Director of the Southwest region. Philo spent a number of years at KPMG as a senior consultant before returning to Colorado. He was involved in a number of entrepreneurial ventures while working with a Denver non-profit centered on helping homeless men get back on their feet.

Philo passed away on May 26, 2015 and he was remembered by SigEp HQ past staff at the 54th Grand Chapter necrology in Nashville this year.

Dacre F. Dunn, '41 • JUN 30, 1917 - JUL 4, 2015



On Saturday, July 4th, Colorado Gamma's oldest living alumnus, **Dacre F. Dunn, '41**, passed away from natural causes in Grand Junction, Colorado.

He will be dearly missed by family, friends, and SigEp brothers.

Dacre Francklin Dunn was born in Monte Vista, Colorado and grew up in the San Luis Valley. He graduated from Colorado State University with a BA in Dairy Science and met his wife, Annabelle, while at CSU. They were married prior to Dacre's service in the Navy during WWII.

During his service from 1941-1945, Dacre survived an attack on the USS Wren and then served as the chief gunnery officer on the USS Brownson. In 1949 Dacre, Annabelle, and their two young children moved to Grand Junction, Colorado, where he opened Crescent Creamery. They had two more children while in Grand Junction where Dacre and his partners ran the creamery for many years. The Dunns were

long-time members of St. Matthews Church in Grand Junction.

Dacre and Annabelle enjoyed time in Ouray, Colorado, and Florence, Arizona, during retirement and enjoyed touring the San Juan mountains off-road in their Jeep. The two had been married for nearly 70 years when Annabelle passed away in 2012. Brother Dunn is survived by his four children, Dacre Jr., Gina, Leonard, and Rick, as well as ten grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.
