This all led up to the last poem, Memories, notonly explaining some of the reasons for their topic of the evening, but allowing them a last chance to never forget A & M.



A & M Needs Money - - Teachers

At this time of strain and uncertainty, when college men live from day to day and week to week instead of from year to year as before, each college and university is faced with a vital problem. This problem concerns enrollment which is expected to drop some each quarter. Colorado A&M has an-

ticipated this drop in enrollment. We, however, are now endeavoring to advertise the college in almost every way possible. The main reason for the advertising being to draw high school seniors to A&M after they graduate. Here are some of the projects which we are doing. Our band is going to tour Colorado during spring vacation. A movie on Aggie life has been filmed and is going to be shown to prospective freshmen. The film includes shots of social functions, football games, plus material on such things as classroom work and laboratory work. In addition, during this Christmas vacation, many towns in Colorado held parties for the high school seniors. The purpose of the parties was two fold-to have fun and to interest more students in Aggies.

There is, however, another thought which should be considered. What good are students to a college which hasn't enough money to give them the best education? Let me quote some facts. In a survey made of 22 colleges and universities by the University of Idaho, Colorado A&M teacher's salaries were almost at the bottom of the list. Teachers are also overloaded. Normal standards of students per teacher is 15 to one. Here the ratio is 20 to one. Can any teacher, no matter how proficient, teach his best when underpaid and overworked?

Our college along with all of the other state supported colleges in Colorado is asking for an increase in appropriations from the state legislature.

Looking at the facts, just 20 years ago, in 1930, Colorado A&M served 13,000 people in Colorado; that is, it directly reached one person out of every 78 in the state. In 1950 the college served 38,000 people, directly reaching one person out of every 37. Colorado A&M feels that its appropriation of state funds should parallel its services to the state.

New Finance System

Beginning January 1, the Fraternity Management Company of Columbus, Missouri, took over the bookkeeping for the Fraternity. Their Representative, Bob Downing of Boulder, Colo., is now working with the chapter to set up a comprehensive budget for the remainder of the year. We find this system will aid us much in the setting up of the chapter budget, and maintaining an accurate and detailed account of our finances. Under this system the old Comptrollers position has been replaced by two positions; the steward, Jerry Hinkley, is now in charge of the kitchen and purchasing, and the treasurer's job is still in the hands of John Bowles.

One of the distinct advantages to this system is the continuity from one year to the next as well as being able to obtain expert advice on the operation of the finances.

Bantly and Stoll Named Co-Editors

John Bantly, above, a Bacteriology senior and Bob Stoll, a sophomore Chemistry major were appointed co-editors of the SPEar for the coming school year. They replace Gene Miller, former editor, who is now president of the chapter.

He received a fellowship to Iowa State College at Ames, Iowa, where he worked on and obtained his Master's Degree in Horticulture.

Brother Binkley then worked for a year as a fruit and vegetable inspector. He then worked for the American Crystal Sugar Company where he stayed until 1928, when he once again returned to Colorado A & M as an Associate Professor in Horticulture.

In 1939, he was appointed Professor of Horticulture and head of the department, and is continuing in this capacity.

Brother Binkley worked hard, during the war years and afterwards, to keep Sigma Phi Epsilon going through this period. He was elected and is now serving as President of the Alumni in this vicinity. This summer we were able to have the house redecorated and have a new rug laid down in the living room as a start, for the short time he has been in office.

We congratulate Brother A. M. Binkley for the wonderful job he is accomplishing in serving his fraternity.
