

After winning in competition between members of the Aggie Debate Team, two students were picked to travel to the Hawaiian Islands for a debate tour, March 10 thru 20. One of the two chosen was Rodney Wilson, a Sig Ep, who is a first quarter senior from Fort Morgan, Colorado. The other fellow was Ken Iverson, a freshman from Adams City, Colorado.

Rod is secretary of our Sig Ep Chapter and is majoring in Psychology and Education. He will graduate next March and will receive a commission in the U. S. Field Artillery at that time.

Rod and Ken left by train for San Francisco, where they boarded a United Air Lines Stratocruiser for Honolulu. Nine hours later they arrived in Honolulu and were met by a reception committee from the University of Hawaii. They took a short our of the city and then had lunch with the students at the University. After lunch, they had an interview with the University President, Gregg Sinclair. 

Actives and Alumni Of Colorado Gamma Hold Joint Meeting


