Cash Needed by May 3rd to Secure June Construction Start Alumni Support Essential Now More Than Ever

We have navigated a lot of difficult challenges and have *nearly* everything in place to make the vision of our renovated 121 E Lake home a reality. 2015 will be an exciting year with the start of construction planned for June and the Centennial Homecoming celebration in October.

Our most heartfelt thanks to the 139 brothers who have committed pledges and gifts to put us in the great position we are in—we are so close to starting construction. The 1960s brothers are leading the way with 50 brothers committing \$285,000 to the project.

It says a lot about how meaningful the SigEp experience is that so many brothers want to give back, so future Rams have the same opportunity to learn and grow as SigEps.

As close as we are, we need support from the other 1,400 brothers to wrap up the campaign and push us over the top. We have an urgent need for gifts/pledges by May 3rd in order to close our financing with FirstBank of Northern Colorado. It is truly now or never on closing the loan and starting construction in the narrow one year window we have to complete the renovation. We are working with three student organizations to finalize a lease for 121 E

Lake after construction, before the SigEp chapter returns in 2018.

Mike Williams '10 draws ties between Navy and SigEp

Tell us a bit about your military background?

After graduating from CSU, I went to Officer Candidate School in Newport, RI, and upon graduation was commissioned as a naval officer on June 18, 2010. My first assignment was First Lieutenant on the USS Gridley, an Aegis Destroyer stationed in San Diego. I served on the USS Gridley for three years and earned two Sea Service Deployment ribbons—primarily supporting Seventh Fleet and Fifth Fleet operations.

My second tour was with the USS Green Bay, an amphibious platform which supports US Marine Corps operations. I was the training officer and completed a deployment with the USS Green Bay and facilitated the ship's training schedule while the ship was in the shipyards. Additionally, I was promoted to Lieutenant, O-3, while serving on the Green Bay and completed my service obligation in July of 2014.

What's the one story from your service you would tell your grandchildren?

There is one experience I will always remember and love sharing. When I was a LT j.g. on the USS Gridley, the Commanding Officer chose me to be his Officer of the Deck to get underway from Singapore and assist navigat-

ing the ship through the Straits of Malacca. To explain what the Straits of Malacca are like, imagine I-25, in wintry conditions, rush-hour traffic, and all cars are traveling at a minimum of 50 mph. However, instead of cars and on land, the Straits of Malacca are congested with huge merchant/cargo ships in the ocean. It is chaos and the busiest strait in the world.

The entire underway evolution takes several hours—my palms were sweating the entire time. It is these moments in a sailor's job where he utilizes all aspects of his training, performs at a varsity level, and ensures the ship and its entire crew travel safely and makes good time towards their next mission. I had an awesome team to assist me and the Commanding Officer and I maintained good communications throughout the detail. It ended up being one of the ship's best sea and anchor details, considering the elements we had to work with.

What's the relationship between your military service and SigEp experience, and how have they impacted your life?

I had a successful Navy experience because of my time in SigEp. The fraternity taught me best how to work and collaborate with peers effectively—which is important for any junior officer. Additionally, the fraternity is similarly structured like a ship's wardroom

(officer's mess). In a wardroom, a junior officer must have a strong relationship with his fellow sailors and senior officers in order to ensure his division has all the resources it needs to fulfill its mission.

Do you still keep up with any SigEp brothers?

Yes. I stay in contact, and meet up regularly, with brothers Eric Sutton, Andrew Dibala, James Stuart, Bijah Gibson, Cameron Acres, and many more.
